





- -The mental persistence of the Iron Curtain: let's stop saying "Eastern Block"&"Eastern Europe" ("Third World Country" is also Cold War language: let's please try to avoid it)
- -Also deprecating language: "one of those (economically) small countries in Eastern Europe"
- -Somewhat acceptable: Balkans
- -Even better: Using the names of individual countries

The former USSR comprised 15 republics:

Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belorussia (now Belarus), Estonia, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Kirgiziya (now Kyrgyzstan), Latvia, Lithuania, Moldavia (now Moldova), Russia, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, Ukraine, and Uzbekistan

Former Yugoslavia comprised 6 republics:

Bosnia and Herzegovina, Croatia, Macedonia, Montenegro, Serbia (including the regions of Kosovo and Vojvodina), and Slovenia (ethnic wars - 1991 to 2001 - a little more complicated here...)

Former Czechoslovakia comprised 2 countries:

the Czech Republic and Slovakia.

Communism = collectivistic speech depersonalized/dehumanised:

- -national identity (see above) + exaggerated patriotism -individual identity
 - ->the right to freedom of speech
 - ->the right to freedom of location
 - ->the right to privacy.

Breaking some "myths" about Romania:

- -Romanian is a Latin (not Slavic) language
- -We don't like references to Dracula & Bran Castle
- -Vlad Tepes is a bit of a national hero, rebelling against corruption and the Ottomans
- -We learn at least 2-3 foreign languages in school (+world history and literature) and can understand most Latin languages.
